A few points to remember when going for an interview are...

-Have your resume on hand, along with a list of questions, references, and written work, if applicable, to give the interviewer.

And now I graduate, not only from college but with lots of experience under my belt. Not only from school but from interviewing and work experience—while hitting the books. These skills I happily share with you.


time, we should all be there for one another and come out of this stronger than ever.





As our semester comes to an end, I wanted to take this time to reflect on our first PRSSA






# How I Balanced School and Work in a Remote Environment




